International conference FOREST REHABILITATION AFTER SLEET 19-20 March 2015

All articles submitted by participants at the International Conference FOREST **REHABILITATION AFTER SLEET** will be published in the conference publication. We have prepared instructions for authors for writing the articles.

STRUCTURE OF THE ARTICLE

The structure of the article is divided into the following elements:

- title (in the original and in English language),
- information about the authors: name and surname of the author/s, address and email address of each author and co-authors,
- abstract and keywords (in the original and in English language),
- introduction,
- the main part,
- conclusions.
- references,
- annexes (if any).

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

All articles should be written:

- text aligned on both sides (justify)
- size of characters in the text: 12 points
- font: Times New Roman
- line spacing: 1.5 line spacing
- borders: 2.5 cm
- notes are cited below the line in Times New Roman, 10 point

2.1 THE TITLE. ABSTRACT AND KEYWORDS

- titles should be in Times New Roman, size 12 point
- the abstract should be in the original and in English language
- the abstract comprises 150-200 words in the original and in English language
- 3 to 6 key words are listed in order of importance

2.2 TABLES

- should be marked with consecutive numbers
- must have a descriptive title above the table and the source cited
- text should be centre aligned

2.3 ILLUSTRATIONS

Graphs, schematics, photos and other types of illustration should be all named **Illustrations**:

- illustrations must be marked in the text with sequential numbers
- illustration must be properly titled (under the image)

3 CITING LITERATURE AND SOURCES

For writing the articles it is recommended you use the **Harvard system of referencing or citing.** It directly links quotations with bibliographic units from the list of literature through the use of round brackets at the end of the sentence.

3.1 THE IN-TEXT CITATION

- When citing the work of one author, first state **the author** of the quote, then **the year of the work** the quote was taken from, and **the page** on which the quote is written.
- e.g.: (Young, 2013, p. 43) or (Boeri, 2000, p. 48–51)
 - When referring to a specific idea **without citing**, the source is marked in the following way: (Brejc, 2009).
- *e.g.*: (Brus, 2010) or (Šuster in Dinevski, 2011)

3.2 THE REFERENCE LIST

When citing literature and sources, one must include all the works that were used in any way for writing the article. Reference lists in Harvard are **arranged alphabetically by first author**.

- **Reference list entry for a book:**Surname, Initials. Publication year in brackets. *Book title italicised*. Series title and volume if applicable. Edition if not the first. Place of publication: publisher.
- e.g.: Perko, F., 2011. *Gozd lahko živi brez človeka, ljudje ne morejo brez gozda: raba in gospodarjenje z gozdovi v Sloveniji od začetkov do danes*. Ljubljana: Zveza gozdarskih društev Slovenije, Gozdarska založba: Jutro.
 - Reference list entry for books with two authors:

 Surname, Initials. & Surname, Initials. Publication year in brackets. *Book title italicised*.

 Series title and volume if applicable. Edition if not the first. Place of publication: publisher.
 - Reference list entry for a website:

Author of website FAMILY/SURNAME, Initials or WEBSITE name if no author is available. Year. *Title of website in italics*. Any numbers if necessary or available if website is part of a series. [Online in square brackets] Available from: URL. [Accessed: followed by date in square brackets].

e.g.: Marks & Spencer, 2004. *Annual report 2003-2004*. [Online]. Available from: http://www-marks-and-spencer.co.uk/corporate/annual2003/ [Accessed: 4th June 2005].
